Tech Talk 4

AAGB Website Update

The Website Development project is on track and the main focus of work since the last AASN update has been on the build of the actual website itself, and work to prepare and update content to be transferred to the new site. The Project Team are planning to start initial testing in the next couple of weeks.

Castlegate IT, the web development agency, has been building the main pages for the first two levels of the site. This includes the structure for the new AA Shop which will be easier to navigate, with literature items clearly listed and much easier to find. GSO are evaluating options to introduce an additional payment system in addition to PayPal so that purchasing your literature is straightforward.

As well as developing the main structural pages, template pages, such as the 'flex page', have been developed to build out the site and add different types of content. Using templates will help maintain a consistent look and feel for pages throughout the site.

To ensure consistency of content and that the

new AAGB "family look" is followed, a Style Guide is being put together which will be used by the Project Team to update existing content across the site. Going forward the Guide will also be available to help future creators of new content follow the same style. Content for the top-level pages is the current focus. Relevant content will be transferred to the new site directly with out-of-date content being brought up to date before moving over. Content that has been superseded will be archived.

There is still a lot to do but it is really exciting to see all the hard work coming together with the initial pages of the new site becoming visible for the first time.

Sub-Saharan Africa Service Meeting (SSASM)

Many members of the Fellowship will see the mention of Sub-Sahara in the General Service Board 'Bullets' and accounts but may have little idea as to what this relates. For those interested, background information on the history of the SSASM is found in the AA Structure Handbook.

I had the privilege of attending the most recent meeting on Zoom during the weekend of 30th June and 1/2nd July. The meetings are held bi-annually, and I had attended the previous meeting in 2021 (online again because of Covid) as an observer. It was an exhausting experience (a bit like Conference) but enlightening and informative.

The attendees were 1st and 2nd year delegates from the following countries:

- Botswana
- Eswatini (Swaziland)
- Ghana
- Kenya
- Lesotho
- Malawi
- Namibia
- South Africa
- Tanzania
- Uganda
- Zambia, and
- Zimbabwe

Racy J and Bob W were present representing the General Service Office (GSO) USA /Canada together with Ranjan B and I, representing AAGB - the two sponsoring countries for the conference.

In addition to presentations and reports from the individual countries the conference looked at two key issues:

1. **SSASM moving toward being self-supporting and developing country to country sponsorship to support this.**

The countries are quite different and are at differing stages of development regarding AA and meetings. South Africa is the most developed of the African countries as it has its own GSO and a well-established structure but many of the other countries struggle to achieve this because of size and population. An example of this is Namibia where face to face meetings are only held in two towns with three meetings a week.

Many of the countries have kept on-line meetings after the pandemic which help reach the still

suffering alcoholic, but at the same time, presents problems for the service structure.

2. Problems other than alcohol

It became apparent from this that there are similar problems worldwide.

Ranjan B made a presentation on the Traditions and group autonomy a reminder for us all that the programme of AA is not just the Twelve Steps but the Twelve Traditions and Concepts which are the backbone of recovery.

My own presentation was on the structure of AA in Great Britain. I had thought when preparing this that there would not be much interest as our “upside down triangle” is so well known to us all.

How wrong was I!

There was a huge amount of interest as most of the countries have so few groups and members that for them, the idea of intergroups and regions is way into the future. What an eye-opener for me.

It made me realise how fortunate I am to have the structure and support of the Fellowship in my recovery. I take it all for granted.

On the other side of the coin, as one of the delegates pointed out, they are the pioneers in their continent and have opportunities given to early members of AA to carry the message and build up their own structure.

The experience of the conference weekend will stay with me for many years to come.

Restraint of Pen & Tongue

On Friday and Saturday 21/22 July, the General Service Board (GSB) held its annual workshop, in which we look to develop our knowledge and awareness of matters that affect the Fellowship and the charity. For the first time, all 16 Regions were invited to send up to two representatives via Zoom to a hybrid session in which we sought to address four questions:

1. Rotation of Trustees (How we can best support Regions with No Trustees)
2. Regions with no Trustees long term - what we can do about it? How can we help?
3. Annual Conference - Regions with a lack of delegates, how can we improve this?
4. Board Sub Committees - what is the best way for the Board Sub Committees to interface with the Regions?

Currently four regions have no trustee, while some fielded fewer than the complement of six delegates at Conference.

We received some helpful and insightful contributions from our guests, despite initial technical glitches. The absence of a trustee from every region means that the workload of the others is increased, and most importantly that the vital interface between a region and the GSB is broken. The GSB reminded regions that we are happy to send a substitute trustee (perhaps from an adjoining region) to a region assembly if we are asked, provided sufficient notice is given. Please do consider service as a trustee at this, the lowest level of our upside-down triangle if you have completed a full term at Conference and have 10 years of continuous sobriety. It can be a fulfilling and interesting service and many report a spiritual shift in their recovery. Your region needs to endorse at least two candidates, and each assembly may have individual nomination processes.

I need to mention that we have received reports of behaviour that deters some from service at all levels. People undertaking service have been harassed, bullied at more than one convention meeting, and assembly has resulted in servants of our Fellowship being reduced to tears by over-zealous members crossing the line. Similarly, some correspondence has included personal attacks on trusted servants. We are all accountable for our actions, including our service activity, but this is a Fellowship that seeks to support, not belittle people, and were there a two-word motto for our best behaviour in recovery, it might well read, 'Be Kind.'

If we witness such behaviour at our service meetings and do and say nothing, we risk enabling it and so providing tacit support for those



behaving like internet trolls, and not as servants of AA.

I would hope that we can adopt a way of working with each other where we suggest, rather than demand, and look to work as colleagues alongside one another and not shout across the table, whether literally or in our demeanour. In service we have a single primary purpose, and we should look for the best ways to fulfil that obligation. Please may we stifle the adjectives used to describe others' perceived motivations or activity, and aim to focus on Outcomes, not Outrage.

London Convention

Armed Services Meeting 30 April 2023

The Armed Services meeting took place on the Saturday evening of the London Convention. This is the first one associated with the Convention and was arranged by Josh, Regional Armed Services Liaison Officer (RASLO) for the London South Region.

The meeting was attended by nine members, five ex-service members, one police officer, one service family member, one social worker and an AA member.

Josh opened the meeting, and everybody shared a little of their experience with the armed services and about themselves. We then discussed what could be done to reach the alcoholic who has served and is still suffering from alcoholism in active service.

We agreed there was a big gap in commitments in this service area and we needed to encourage people into service, whilst continuing to get out to service personnel. We agreed that this meeting was very beneficial in getting to know people who had only been on the end of the phone or email. It also highlighted the amount of work there is to do.

Here are some observations made by an Armed Services Liaison Officer (ASLO) attending the meeting:

1. It was good to see the likes of the Blue Lights (Police) and a lady who was from a generational army family. It reminded me that alcoholism is a family disease and made me mindful that whilst we currently have a military / ex-military focus, other uniforms are out there also. In the end "we are responsible" but is the Armed Services a bit too narrow in its service function?
2. Like other service positions in AA, we are under staffed - it is the way it is, but I sense Covid-19 took us backwards resource wise.
3. I know there was only a few attending that were from the South - but do we try and sort out a (quarterly) online ASLO /RASLO meeting?
4. Could a simple localised directory be useful?
5. Getting in the front door of military establishments can be tough and lead to no results. Armed Services be more accessible using the sides like, 'HIVE', Royal British Legion and Association of Armed Drop-in Centres.

The General Service Office



The General Service Office (GSO) is the executive arm of the Fellowship and provides services for Alcoholics Anonymous through GSO in York, the Northern Service Office (NSO) in Glasgow and the Southern Service Office (SSO) in London.

The GSO, NSO and SSO are not the authority in Alcoholics Anonymous, rather our role is to execute the objectives of the charity. We act as the central point of contact for the

Fellowship providing links between the 16 Regions (including Continental Europe), 115 Intergroups and 4,794 Groups across the United Kingdom (as of July 2023), as well as GSOs throughout the world.

In addition, we house the European Information Centre, communicating regularly with other General Service Offices across Europe and organising the biennial European Service Meeting.

10 Toft Green, York, has been GSO's home since early 2007 and is the registered office of the charity Alcoholics Anonymous (Great Britain) Limited.

We have a small team of staff, who are passionate about providing services to the Fellowship as efficiently as possible, and always with care and consideration. At present, GSO has 11 full time and 4 part time staff members, with 2 part time staff members at NSO, and 1 full time and 1 part time staff members at SSO. We really try to look after our staff and their Welfare Policy includes Safeguarding, Bullying & Harassment and Equality & Diversity policies as well as an Employee Assistance Program.

Our longest serving member of staff has been with us for 33 years! Once people are employed here, they tend to stay till they retire! It really is a lovely place to work.

Between us we have a wealth of experience in which to assist the Fellowship and answer the huge range of queries we receive. During a typical week GSO, NSO & SSO receive:

- 80 items of postal Mail
- 500 telephone calls
- 50 visitors
- 3,500 emails

Last year the offices received nearly 22,000 telephone calls and over 165,000 emails. The main day to day functions of the offices are the publication and distribution of literature, financial controls, managing and updating group records, the production of SHARE and Roundabout magazines, the co-ordination of AA's national Conference, and supporting and organising the work of the General Service Board.

The literature distribution centre for the fellowship is based at GSO. We receive, process, pack and dispatch all the orders of Conference approved literature to members

across the country and Europe. We also send other service literature and material such as information packs for schools and banners for PI events or conventions.

Last month we received 1,342 literature orders and in an average week GSO will send out 350 packets and parcels. At one point we were one of Parcelforce's largest users in York!

Our accounts department look after the day-to-day administration of our finances, as well as processing all orders and contributions received. They produce monthly and quarterly accounts and work closely with our auditors to compile the charity's annual accounts.

Group records are responsible for managing our database which contains records of all groups, intergroups, regions, trustees and more. This database is used to produce the London and national 'Where to Find' and the 'Confidential Directory'. They receive on average 115 emails per week along with many 'pink forms' by post, which contain details of new meetings or amendments to current groups. We rely on these to make sure that the meetings list is as up to date as possible, so please regularly check your group's details and send us any changes. Once completed, updates can be seen immediately on the website.

The administration of SHARE and Roundabout magazines is undertaken at the office. This includes everything right through from typing up of articles and processing subscriptions to manually packing each issue ready for dispatch. It's a busy time now preparing for the annual calendars and diaries which will be available soon.

Staff at GSO co-ordinate and produce minutes and reports for the annual General Service Conference, Board Meetings, and the biennial European Service Meeting. We organise liaison meetings and Board sub-committee meetings, which along with the Board Meetings are held in the offices at 10 Toft Green.

Other day to day tasks for staff includes answering queries from members, professionals and the media and updating the website. Work will soon start on moving current web content to the new website, and it is keeping everyone busy. Another big project coming up is the redesign of literature to a standard house style, as approved at AA's most recent Conference in April. The Prison Postal Service is also administered at the office, new sponsors are always welcome...

Although I have covered some of the services provided by the staff, they are by no means comprehensive. There are always new situations arising and although everyone has their own jobs, we often work together and help each other if anyone is under pressure. I know I speak for all the staff when I say we try our hardest to provide the best service we possibly can for the Fellowship.

My name is...

...**Josh** and I am an alcoholic. What at an admission! Once I'd realised I was an alcoholic, there was no hesitation in admitting I was powerless over alcohol and that my life was unmanageable - one hundred percent!

Having mental health issues though, now this is another matter. Mental Health is a topic that I have come to understand as an 'outside issue' to AA, even though poor mental health has been with me all my life... depression, anxiety, more depression, anxiety and so on. I just didn't realise it. It was all bound up together in my head with my alcoholism. I could not see my poor mental health until I put down the drink and got sober from alcohol, and took steps towards my emotional sobriety.

In my first two years of sobriety, I began to identify other issues that were not quite right with me. For example, not sleeping, lack of concentration, gut wrenching anxiety and crying all the time. I thought, 'if this is sobriety – you can shove it!' I went back to my doctor who identified clinical depression. Through the guidance of my doctor, I took steps to mitigate my depression. I went to cognitive behavioural therapy and mindfulness classes. I also agreed to take medication to help me, all three changes, along with my 12-step programme turned my depression around. Medication did not affect my sobriety in any way but some people in the Fellowship near me told me that it would, and said I should stop taking medication. This I did. I went through terrible withdrawal from the medication (worse than coming off the drink) and I became clinically depressed again. I was advised by my sponsor that AA does not have an opinion on medical matters as these are issues outside of the Fellowship.

Since I elected to stay sober one day at a time, not pick up that first drink, and keep on my course of meds which continue to help me with anxiety and depression, I have been more balanced and this has allowed me to grow and experience emotional sobriety – a bit at a time, a day at a time.

I had (and still have, if I do not work my programme) crippling social anxiety, and anxiety full stop about everything. This was a trigger for my clinical depression. I thought what can I do about it how can I get out of self! Doing service across each level of the Fellowship was an absolute life saver for me. It has helped me increase my connection with other people, improve my skills, self-worth and confidence. Giving back, I found, was a great way to move forward emotionally. I worked through social anxiety and found some understanding with boundaries. I can now begin at the beginning of projects and work through them to the end. I found that people are OK if you give them time and space, just as they have for me. It is amazing how it works! I have not returned to clinical depression.

Fast forwarding to the present, I knew that something else was still not quite right in the way I behaved around people and social situations, where I became overwhelmed. Fortunately, I have some days of sobriety under my belt, and some self-knowledge which propelled to me to seek further help and diagnosis. It turned out that I am on the autism spectrum. Recognising this was like recognising I am an alcoholic. Work on my autism and my understanding of it has only just begun. It is a revelation – a similar experience to understanding my alcoholism. It is another piece of the

jigsaw of my life that has fitted into place, and I now know that I can seek further help.

I hope my story of depression, autism diagnosis and mental health helps you. If I'd not got sober, my clinical depression would not have been diagnosed and sorted (one day at a time), and my autism would not have been diagnosed (now being understood and explored one day at a time).

My sobriety keeps on revealing more and more, just as long as I follow the path that is destined for me, that I keep my faith and remain prepared to take action.

Westgate Sunday Morning Big Book Meeting

Are you willing to be the hand of AA?



I have been involved in service all my sober life, it started when I went for my first meeting with my new sponsor, the first sponsor that showed me what sobriety looked like. (I had been knocking about AA for 6 months and not been able to stop). I knocked on his door expecting to be invited in for a cup of tea and a chat, instead he came out coat in hand, asked where my car was, and off we set. "Where are we going?" I said. "I've a 12th step call to make, you might as well come and learn what it's all about."

He took me through the 12 steps, and put me into service at our local group, where he was adamant that the 7th tradition included everything. This was our group, and we were responsible for making sure the room was set up in time to start, cleared up when it was finished, and any washing up and tidying up done. Our group needed to provide the servants to do that, we never asked for help, although we wouldn't refuse it if it were offered, as it might give another a chance to be of service.

Before I was 12 months sober, he started meeting me at the local Telephone Office which we were lucky enough to have in Bristol. We would spend the time waiting for phone calls reading AA literature and discussing the steps. He taught me how to answer calls, and how to arrange 12th step calls, and it soon came that I was looking forward to getting my one-year anniversary so I could start doing it on my own.

I loved it, I got involved in the service committee that helped it run, and created an online meeting finder, as the internet was just starting to grow in popularity.

When the General Service Board started its own site, I wanted to get involved, and managed to get invited to a meeting in Hull in 2003 when we were shown among other things, a new email help system that was being developed, and we received one of the first incoming emails asking for help! I was hooked on the concept, and soon what was initially called the E-12th Steppers was formed (later to change its name to its current identity of the Online Response Service (ORS) – acknowledging that fact that our main aim was to get people to call the helpline so they could arrange a 12th step call locally)

It was fabulous, and so rewarding being that first point of contact with the still suffering alcoholic. The big advantage was that being national we received more contacts than I was used to on the Telephone Service. I had known times when on the telephone service I could sometimes do a full morning on duty in the office and get no calls. In the same period on ORS it wasn't unusual to have to deal with upwards of 6 emails in a morning shift, and this was some 20 years ago!

What was interesting too, was to see how often, when we recruited a new person to the service there would erupt around them a little bubble of enthusiasm, as they told people of the joy the service was giving them, others from the meetings they attended would become interested and apply to join us.

After rotating off that service I maintained an involvement in service in various roles. When a little later we moved to live in Continental European Region, electronic communications became even more important to me, enabling me to continue to be of service. Of course, I can't do telephone service here, although I have been able to do the occasional 12th step call through our local group phone.

A few years later, the 2016 Service Conference introduced the Chat Now service, which I would later join, and enjoy being part of.

I can't honestly say which I prefer! The telephone service is fabulous, hearing the voice of the still suffering alcoholic and trying to arrange a 12th step call for them, it was a great starting point, even though location means I can no longer take part in that.

Being a member of the Online Response Service, and being a part of a team that responds to the emails we receive from people looking for help, who perhaps are reluctant at first to pick up a phone, but are willing to talk to us behind the anonymity of a keyboard, and we have the time to create a response to them; or the Chat Now service, for those that want the anonymity of keyboard, but the instant response of someone live on the other end of the connection. I could recommend each one as having been a way of helping me carry out my own 12th Step work, and in a way contributing towards my 9th Step too by helping others, thus making amends to people I don't know, as a way of apology to all those unknown people that I hurt in so many ways when I was drinking.

One difficulty that both these services have is that, while the Telephone Service is reported on regularly at Intergroup and Regional meetings, the ORS and Chat Now service are rarely spoken of, due to being organised at Board Sub-Committee level. They both must use the principle of rotation so we're always in need of new responders.

If they sound like they might interest you, doing such a vital service from the comfort of your own home wherever you live, why not get in touch with us and we will tell you more about it?

There is a new subcommittee formed called the First Response Online Sub-Committee, which is currently looking for volunteers, but perhaps more importantly, we need volunteers on Chat Now and the Online Response Service to learn how to respond. By doing so they help the still suffering alcoholic reaching out, find the hand of AA that we proudly say needs to always be there.

Gratitude is more than an attitude, it needs be an action, or else how else do we show it?

People of Colour Working Group



It is exciting to be part of this Working Group. We have gotten to know each other through honest, mutual sharing of ideas, underpinning approaches, and solutions to a complicated but important subject of inclusivity. There is a sense of empowerment and togetherness in the group, a shared vision of how best to pass AA's message to everyone, irrespective of race, creed, and culture.

The journey

The group first came into fruition as a direct result of a recommendation from the 2021 Conference. The question related to a lack of people from ethnic backgrounds within the service structure of AAGB.

We met as a group for the first time on November 17th, 2021, and held our first ever online convention in October 2022, entitled "No longer Silent: Who's not in the room?". This consisted of presentations, shares, and two concurrent discussion sessions. Both addressed the theme of cultural barriers to and within AA, specifically around issues to do with accessibility, entry, integration and service.

It was important to seize on the momentum from the October 2022 convention, which resulted in a second, equally successful "Race Today: Tomorrow" online convention in March 2023 and a tremendous 'Race Today, Tomorrow' workshop at the Tower of London convention in April this year.

Afterwards everyone came to me to say how wonderful it was to hear me speak. I am an Asian lady and come from a big family. In 2020 I was at my rock bottom. I couldn’t stop drinking. I have found my Higher Powers in AA. It has saved my life.’



Presenting at a convention is a powerful tool to effectively deliver a message on culture and diversity to the wider AA community. Speaking at a convention allowed me to engage with an eager audience, share valuable insights, and forge lasting connections. The presentation was very well-received and allowed me to connect with people interested in doing similar work.'

Connecting with others in AA goes beyond simply exchanging contact information; we build meaningful relationships with people who share a common passion for ensuring the hand of AA reaches all communities. By connecting with others, we gain the opportunity to share ideas, collaborate, and build a thriving community that fosters innovation and change in the fellowship. The experience elevated my understanding of other work in this space and reinforced the importance of communication in shaping ideas and inspiring change.

I hope to have the opportunity to deliver similar workshops at other conventions to socialise the work we have been doing in Birmingham.'

AA Goes to Westminster

On the 12 May this year, AA, through the work of the Parliamentary Event subcommittee, held the 19th Annual Presentation and Reception of Alcoholics Anonymous at Portcullis House in Westminster. The aim of this event is to help professionals and Parliamentarians get a better understanding of AA, who we are and how we can help the still suffering alcoholic.

This year's sponsor was Steve Brine, Conservative MP for Winchester and Chandlers Ford, and current Chair of the Health and Social Care Select Committee.

The event started with Steve Brine opening the event and welcoming the guests, primarily, health and social care professionals and those working with people whose alcoholism is part of the problem.

The next two speakers were Louise Foxcroft, former AA Non-Alcoholic Trustee, who spoke about her experience of being a Board member of the General Service Board of AAGB and her experience of seeing the Fellowship in action. The next speaker was Kieran Lynch, Senior Substance Misuse Integration Manager, NHS England. He spoke about the benefits of AA and his experience of working with AA in the field of recovery. Both speakers gave compelling messages.

Following that, there were two AA speakers, Shon F and Christian C, who shared their experience strength and hope. The change of atmosphere in the room was palpable when the AA members shared their stories. Proving yet again that talking about how it works from a personal point of view, is the most powerful tool we have when spreading the message - whether it be to the still suffering alcoholic or explaining to professionals what is on offer in these rooms.

The question-and-answer session made it clear that the speakers had sparked a real interest, as did the conversations afterwards. The turnout of invited attendees was good this year and that is mainly thanks to the Fellowship. Our aim is to get as many 'warm' contacts as possible, from serving intergroup and regional PI/Health/Employment officers or committees. These contacts would be people or organisations that we already have some kind of contact or relationship with, and we can ask if they could liaise with us to invite their colleagues and professional peers, who may not know much about AA, to come along.



2024 will be our 20th year delivering this event and we would like to reach more people than ever. We will be calling out to the Fellowship over the next few months for those 'warm' contacts and start getting people interested in coming along to our event. Now more than ever we need your help to let the health and social care sectors know who we are, and hopefully clear up some of the myths that still prevail about AA, even today.

General Service Board Vacancies


What is a Sub Committee and what does it do?

A sub-committee is made up of alcoholics with usually five years sobriety and service experience down the AA structure. It is a committee that delivers Conference recommendations, and is chaired by a Trustee of the General Service Board

All sub-committee members go through an application and interview process. There are usually vacancies listed quarterly in AASN, together with a deadline for submission for application and criteria which you will need to meet as part of your application.

It's a rewarding job being on a sub-committee, by both carrying the message and the conscience of the Fellowship.

How to Apply

When applying for **any** of the sub-committee vacancies below please obtain an up-to-date application form from either Jenny Pryke at GSO, PO Box 1, 10 Toft Green, York, YO1 7NJ; 01904 644026; jennypryke@gsogb.org.uk or from the Document Library ("Forms") of the AAGB website www.alcoholics-anonymous.org.uk

The chair, vice chair, secretary or a currently serving liaison officer of the sponsoring region or intergroup **must** endorse the application by way of a covering letter.

For any of the vacancies, you will need:

- Five years continuous sobriety
- A good understanding and use of the Steps and Traditions, the AA Service and Structure Handbooks for Great Britain, and other Conference approved AA literature
- Good experience in carrying out service at different levels of the AA service structure
- An understanding and appreciation of the relationship between the General Service Board (GSB) and sub-committees

Sub-committee applicants will be interviewed by two GSB members of the Nominations Committee in a single interview through an online platform, at a time agreed by the applicants.

Successful candidates will be expected to attend four meetings a year; two of these will normally be in York, but the other two may be held via an online platform. The term of service is 4 years.

It is advisable to talk to the relevant Trustee before you apply or upon submitting your application. If you have any questions about specific responsibilities of service on a sub-committee, then please contact the relevant Trustee by using the details found below each vacancy notice.

Archives

Rare Service Opportunity to Take the Pulse of AA

Summary

The General Service Board (GSB) Survey Sub Committee (SSC) seeks new members to assist in executing the next membership-wide survey. Strategic planning sessions were launched summer 2022. Minimum 5 years sobriety. Details and application info below.

What is the Pulse of AA Post-Pandemic?

Every five years the GSB, as mandated by Conference, conducts a membership-wide survey to keep abreast of trends in our Fellowship's characteristics. The survey provides factual numbers for the professional community and public as prescribed by our primary purpose, to carry the message to those suffering from alcoholism.

The pandemic and its subsequent restrictions, however, upended 'business as usual'. In particular, a groups' reliance on 'snail mail' to receive important communications.

Consequently, the SSC, responsible for planning, execution and managing the 2020 survey, had to pivot at the 11th hour, and deploy an online-only survey model. Despite reaching only groups with an email contact on record with York, the survey produced critical key insights gathered from over 3000 Groups in Great Britain and the Continental Europe Region (CER).

Rare Opportunity

Valuable lessons were learned by the SSC from its first digital survey undertaking. Lessons it seeks to leverage, ensuring that the next survey measures what is most important to members, the public and the professional community in these fast-changing times.

But currently, the SSC is disadvantaged with too few committee members. The SSC's problem, therefore, offers you a rare opportunity to join its existing core team as they begin strategic planning for the 2025 Survey

Telephones (NTL)

The Telephones Sub Committee comprises of a group of people organising the initial contact or first response, to the still suffering alcoholic via the telephone.

Experience of the telephone service at regional or intergroup level and a willingness to use and be informed about current communication systems would be an advantage. The role may require frequent contact with members involved in the telephone service at all levels of the Fellowship.

Requirements for the telephones sub- committee are to:

- maintain the existing telephone system to enable the suffering alcoholic access to a local contact through a single national telephone number, in a manner which is efficient, effective and economic.
- Keep the use and cost of the system under constant review.
- Be involved in all changes to the system and to liaise with the system provider following consultation with regions.
- Investigate any new technology which may be beneficial to the Fellowship's telephone service
- Maintain a constant review of the facilities offered by other service providers.

With just under five thousand groups to service, GSO is the vital administrative centre of our Fellowship, supported by Northern and Southern Service Offices. 
