CONCEPT VII

Letter from the Conference Steering Committee

In light of the ongoing restrictions in place because of the COVID-19 pandemic the Conference Steering Committee (CSC) met last week to discuss options for holding the General Service Conference in 2021. As the Steering Committee we're committed to maintaining the Service, Unity and Recovery of the Fellowship.

We wrote to you in July of last year to confirm that, on the back of your vote, we were planning to fulfil Conference's obligations for both 2020 and 2021 at the Conference dates set aside in April 2021. We also let you know that we would revisit the possibility of holding a virtual Conference if the impact of the pandemic continued into 2021.

Virtual Conference in April 2021

At our meeting the CSC decided that we can't safely hold a face to face Conference in April 2021. Restrictions continue to be in place across the country and we have no clear guidance on when the situation will change. The CSC therefore decided that we will not hold a physical Conference in April and that, in line with the update we sent you last July, we will run a virtual Conference in April 2021 to fulfil Conference requirements.

What happens next

This will be the first time we have run Conference virtually and so we're now looking at the best way to manage this. In anticipation of this outcome GSO have been working to plan for how we can best run a virtual Conference. There are a number of examples of AA Conferences being run virtually in other countries and we're confident that we can organise this successfully.

We know that you'll be keen to have further information on how this virtual Conference will work. The CSC are meeting again in early February to discuss format, agenda and logistics. As part of that meeting we'll be discussing ways to save time like circulating materials beforehand and shortening the length of Conference.

Following on from this meeting we'll then provide a further update on how Conference will work and will outline the steps we're taking to provide the support and digital platform to host the event.

26th World Service Meeting, November 2020

Nigel P (Chair, General Service Board) and I were among delegates representing Alcoholics Anonymous from around the world who gathered via videoconference November 28-30th for the 26th World Service Meeting (WSM), hosted by the trustees of the General Service Board of Alcoholics Anonymous in the US and Canada.

Because of the Coronavirus pandemic, the three-day event was held virtually for the first time in its history, and was attended by 69 delegates from 44 countries.

Originally scheduled as a face-to-face event, numerous logistical and technical challenges had to be overcome once the shift to a virtual meeting had been determined in response to the global pandemic. Since its inauguration in 1969, the WSM has provided a continuing international forum for sharing experience and ideas on carrying the Alcoholics Anonymous message of recovery around the globe. Its success in bringing together AA's far-flung service centres reflect a final vision of AA co-founder Bill W, who believed that there could be "one world for AA" to assure help would be available to suffering alcoholics, no matter where they are or what language they speak. Currently, an AA presence can be found in more than 180 nations worldwide with membership estimated at over two million.

Traditionally, the meeting alternates on a bi-yearly basis between New York and locations as diverse as Durban, South Africa and Cartagena, Colombia.

Circumstances, however, ushered in an historic opportunity this year and, despite being multiple time zones apart, most delegates found fellowship and connection via their computer screen.

"This has been such a challenging year for everyone," says Mary C, acting International Desk Coordinator at the AA General Service Office in New York, who led the team which hosted the virtual WSM. Nevertheless, she noted, "It's especially important to communicate openly with each other and to share ways in which we can keep AA sustainable and available to everyone."

Simultaneously translated into Spanish and Japanese, workshops, presentations and general sharing sessions addressed such issues as developing AA literature in multiple languages, the importance of women's participation in AA's service structure, and maintaining AA's traditional anonymity in an age of social media. A strong focus of delegates was on the effect the pandemic has had on Alcoholics

Anonymous in terms of members' ability to meet face-to-face as well as the ability of newcomers to find and connect with AA.

Nevertheless, with the onrush of technology and its impact, it was hoped by many delegates that the next World Service Meeting, scheduled for 2022, will be taking place in person. As selected at the 26th WSM, the 27th meeting of delegates from around the world will be taking place in Japan, the first time this meeting will have been held in Asia.

Keeping an AA Prison Group Active in Lockdown

It seems a lifetime ago, but it was only on 18 March last year that the Dorset Prisons Group of AA were informed that our prison meetings would be curtailed due to the pandemic. The following day one of our prison sponsors (with security clearance) asked if he could correspond with the group at The Verne. By return, our main contact in the prison's Substance Misuse team agreed to facilitate this by receiving an email letter, then copying it for distribution to all the inmates who might normally attend our meeting. GSO in York gave us a PO Box to which prisoners could write back, should they wish. All the Verne sponsors agreed to take part and since then we've written letters on a weekly rota.

We've used our letters to share what's been happening in our own recovery and

letters have covered our gratitude for the AA programme and some frank assessments of our character defects, past and present. All our correspondence explores how we seek to live a sober life. One member is using his slot in the rota to give his overview of the Twelve Steps; the Traditions are often referred to, as we describe how we've approached life's challenges, often peppered with quotes from the Big Book.

Receiving letters from the men (even Christmas cards!) has been very gratifying and we were touched to realise that our incarcerated fellows were concerned about us, and the unfamiliar curtailment of our liberty that lockdown had inflicted. We learned that inmates whom we had not yet met -and who had never attended a meeting - were asking to be added to the distribution list for our 'shares', and that we had an ever-growing group.

The Substance Misuse team asked if they could write to "AA Head Office" to commend us for this work. We thanked them for their enthusiasm and their part in the exercise and explained that AA doesn't work like that. Our group conscience thought that a report on how the scheme had worked might be useful to share with other AA members doing prison service and answer any concerns that other prisons might have. We shared this with the High Sheriff of Dorset (the Queen's representative for the justice system in the county), who asked if we would accept an award for this initiative.

This kind offer posed its own challenges. While egos might be stroked, the award would only have use if it could show how 'the hand of AA' can 'always be there'. We made it clear that individual anonymity was essential. We asked that the award could be to the Dorset Prison Group of AA, not individuals. We also sought permission for

the framed award to be displayed in the reception area of the prison, to remind those entering that AA is alive and well in the establishment.

Had we not had our Higher Powers, the Traditions, the support of each other and the wisdom of other members, we might have made a different call. It would have been easy to decline this award, thus avoiding lengthy discussion and soul-searching, but missing out on an opportunity to demonstrate that AA service is alive, despite the pandemic.

Now we're looking forward to the day after lockdown when the award will be accepted on our behalf by the Deputy Governor in a presentation by the High Sheriff, who will be in full regalia of frock coat, trews, stockings and buckled shoes. Funny old world of recovery and service, isn't it?

A Member's Journey in Prison Service

"I have hung up my boots!" My prison service boots, that is – after 35+ years' service.

I remember all too well that first visit, the fear and trepidation I felt at the prospect – "False Expectations Appearing Real"!

I was welcomed in with respect and kind inquisitiveness by the inmates attending. Our message to them was that of change, a change of spirit, perhaps a new opportunity for the soul.

Armed with "one-liners" like "God is not lost", "Try adding another 'o' to God", or "God can stand for a Group of Drunks", a tiny bit of confidence crept in.

I had already been primed with the knowledge that many would come for the free coffee and cigarettes. That was different to the outside, but though often coming for the wrong reasons (pretty good reasons under the circumstances if you ask me), many continued to stay for the right reasons.

It was "Sugar Bill", legendary for his devotion to service in this neck of the woods, who inveigled me into carrying the message "inside the walls".

HMP Longport Canterbury was a classic 19th-Century prison. High walled, stone-built, with tiny barred windows high in each cell, seemingly endless gates with an escort guard jangling keys shouting "Coming through", announcing our passage through the many barred gates to the iron grid stairs and landings. Sometimes thronged with inmates but at other times eerily quiet in "lockdown mode" – no pandemic – just a shortage of staff or a security count taking place, then on to our room, sometimes allocated and at others simply a large cell. I very quickly learnt t feel comfortable amongst the inmates – AA the great leveller.

The message of love came through me and not from me. This was picked up quickly by inmates who sensed that my sharing was "with them", not "at them". The language of "screws and cons" soon became familiar and somehow I always felt protected by the blanket of recovery in which this astonishing Fellowship had lovingly enveloped me.

Inexorably I found myself commandeered (you know, like when in an auction room where you are attending purely as a spectator, you take out a handkerchief to blow your nose and discover you just unwittingly purchased something — so it was when they announced a vacancy at an intergroup meeting) to take a Prison Liaison Officer (PLO) position for East Kent Intergroup.

At that time, we had four establishments in East Kent: HMP Longport, HMP Aldington, HMP Dover, and Dover Young Offenders. Members were always there to form teams of AA sponsors and visitors. Seemingly it wasn't such a big step after three years in that role to find myself being thrust forward for the position of South East Region PLO. Fast forward another three years and I was to find myself volunteering this time to take part, as one member of four, to form the first national sub committee for prisons (General Service Board Prisons Sub Committee) to help the Board member responsible in what had become an onerous task for just one person to carry out. What a privilege, what a joy to attend those meetings at the General Service Office (GSO) in York with dedicated servants of our Fellowship from the four far-flung corners of Great Britain. One contribution lovingly worked on by myself and a sponsee, John S, was a national map of all prisons in GB served (or otherwise) by meetings of the Fellowship, and it was hailed as a meaningful contribution at the time by the Ministry of Justice.

It is almost a decade since I served my three years on the sub committee, at which point, I was gleefully made redundant by the Board. (You need a sense of humour in this game!)

All prisons in East Kent have now ceased to exist. HMP Longport has been purchased by canterbury Christchurch University with part of the old prison being retained for heritage purposes in the future. Perhaps they will have me back in the form of an old waxwork likeness as an exhibit covered in cobwebs!

I continued with prison visits until the arrival of the pandemic last year, sometimes alone, latterly as part of a team, to sponsor meetings in HMP Maidstone under the auspices of West Kent Intergroup until attendance was arrested forcibly under COVID-19 guidelines, a troubling situation which one hopes will soon be addressed.

About 55 years ago, in the early days of my dalliance with this disease, I ventured out on the evening of the first day of use by the police of a piece of equipment called a breathalyser, to take advantage of the last opportunity, as I saw it, of being able to take my car out to celebrate a good drink in my transport of choice — if you want to make God laugh, tell him your plans. Funny how, even in blackout, the memory of the blue flashing light remains indelibly printed on the memory. When I opened the car door at their request, I fell, stupefied, onto the road at the officer's feet. They helped me into the back seat of my car and suggested I "sleep it off" before attempting to drive home. Some twelve years later, the same thing happened (the definition of insanity — "doing the same thing twice and expecting a different result"!), only travelling on this occasion on the wrong side of a dual carriageway at two in the morning — this event costing me my licence for a year. This I believe would be an imprisonable offence these days. "There but for the grace" and "footprints in the sand" come to mind.

The cup of gratitude (unlike some beer mugs) has no lid to cap it off and mine overflows. So, thanks eternally, Sugar Bill, and our Founders, Bill W and Dr Bob, all deceased in body, but never in spirit, for all those wonderful opportunities and for all those who have knowingly or otherwise afforded me the support to "serve my time".

Who was it who said the "t" in "can't" stands for "try"? When it comes to prison service or even the Prison Postal Service, why not go on and give it a go? ODAAT.

Reinventing the Wheel

Much has been written about Service! Unsurprisingly here in AA Service News! How does our great Fellowship recruit, encourage and maintain members in service? Sharing and sponsorship into and within service is always the key. How do we know what the other is doing or even know how things are done if we don't open our mouths? Obviously being mindful to listen too!

I'm part of the Telephone Service Team for the Wales and Borders Region. I was encouraged by one of our Intergroup Telephone Liaison Officers (TLO's) to share our recent experiences through the pandemic. He remarked that he had got ideas to take back to his intergroup from articles in *Service News*.

Our Telephone Service nationally can be both blessed and cursed by our wonderful AA structure. There are 40 odd helplines active through the freephone 0800 number that pretty much all do things differently! There are a multitude of members across the UK from the Trustee through the sub committee, TLOs at region and intergroup, the Telephone Responders available 24/7 through to the thousands of 12th Steppers – we could always do with more! All working hard with the aim of trying to achieve our Primary Purpose and by some miracle of, I suspect a Higher Power, it seems to work!

The general guidance within our *Service Handbook*, Chapter 10, Telephone Services, is due for review at Conference this year. This will take some time though. In the mean time we work with what we've got. This inevitably means we sometimes re-invent the wheel so to speak! Each helpline coming up with ideas and solutions to the issues and running of our telephone helplines.

Here are just a couple of ideas our region has worked on during the pandemic in the hope your helpline may find them useful, or you might have, or they might generate other ideas. Maybe an item for next quarter's *Service News*?

In November we used our new found familiarity with Zoom to hold an online meeting of our seven Intergroup TLO's. Our Region is geographically large so this was the first time most of us had met "face-to-face" as it were! It was very successful! It was so much easier to share ideas and discuss issues rather than through endless emails or texts and to put faces to voices and names!

One reason for not coming forward for service is perhaps fear of the unknown? So, support (sponsorship) into service is important. As a result of our discussions at the Zoom meeting one of our TLOs shared that he had used "role play" in order to train new Responders. So, we were able to put together a new training aid for Intergroup TLOs. It is designed to give new Responders confidence, where the ITLO acts as the

"caller", using their experience on the helpline to suggest ways of dealing with different types of call. For example: "I drink too much, am I an alcoholic?", "My Doctor suggested I go to AA – what is it?", "My partner drinks too much – what can I do?" When you go on your first shift you don't know what to expect, so the sharing of experience is a vital tool.

If you would like to know more detail please contact me. My contact details are on the Confidential Directory. I'll happily forward our training sheet. You may already do something like this – if so, that's fine. Please will you share your versions? It may save us from "re-inventing the wheel"!

I've also heard, by talking to other members connected with the telephone service how they have used Zoom as a tool to help 12 Steppers guide newcomers onto their first Zoom meetings. A bit like meeting them outside the physical venue! What a great idea and I'm sure there are many more!

Service for me has been life changing and I happily share that experience. I am optimistic that we will continue to combine our shared experience to provide the best Telephone Service we can. Realism too that things will happen in my Higher Power's time not mine! Sharing though will hopefully "grease the wheels"!

a poll that was made via Zoom evidenced this. The Q & A session at the end was a great way to see that the people were engaged.

I would like to thank the sub committee for their professional attitude and the way the technology was handled by the sub committee, including a Power Point presentation.

After some sterling work by Andrew, James, Jim, and Rob in setting up this presentation with assistance from the rest of the sub committee, we have now completed two presentations to managers of the major insurance company, and these are my observations on how successful I believe they were.

Looking at the faces of the managers as they listened to the presentations was a very good insight into the effect it was having on them as Zoom is a very good tool to see this I believe. The introduction, slides, and Rob's experience, strength and hope were very powerful, and this could be seen by the expressions on the managers' faces, especially during Rob's share.

The question-and-answer session, I feel, was very helpful, and by the quality of the questions we know that we had held their attention throughout. Also, in my humble opinion, the evaluation poll we held at the end of the session proved that Zoom presentations work, are a really powerful tool, and an inexpensive way to move forward for AA as a whole.

Further, I would like to inform anyone reading this that might feel that they could never play a part by joining a sub committee or doing similar service at this level, please do not tell yourself this, as you will be missing out on a very positive piece of Twelve Step work as well as a special spiritual experience.

I came in to my first meeting on 2nd January, 1989, at the Seamans' Mission in London's Docklands — a dyslexic plumber from the East End of London who believed his life to be over! If you told me then that I would be playing a part 31 years later in a presentation to managers of a large insurance company on the internet (which didn't exist at that time), I would have blasphemed, that is for sure, but the power of service pushes the boundaries slowly, slowly, like taking baby steps, and you move on through service positions with the help of a sponsor and others on the way. It

truly is a powerful programme! Also, my disability (Dyslexia) has proven to be an asset as I tend to look at things from a different perspective to my fellows.

Finally, I will always remember being the Tea Maker in my early days at a Friday night meeting, and on my way there, I walked past a famous seafood stall in Aldgate, London, and there having a bowl of eels was a boyhood friend and drinking partner of mine whom I hadn't seen for a few years. He was pleased to see me and invited me to go for a drink with friends of ours, and as much as I wanted to go (as it set that Phenomenon of Craving off once again), I was able to say "No thanks!" as I was on my way to meet some other friends. I didn't say who or that the reason that I had the tea, sugar and milk in my hand was for an AA meeting, but I didn't want to let you down, and that piece of service saved my life, so I think I will keep coming back ~ it works!

Rob D:

I have been part of the Employment Sub Committee (ESC) for just over two years. My background to this was that I had worked in the Civil Service for 44 years, in the course of which I met employers of all types and sizes, and thus built up an understanding of how they "tick" and what their prime motivators are.

My 30 years of heavy drinking which became alcoholic, brought me to AA.

Once I was established in AA and doing service, I had always been interested in becoming an Employment Liaison Officer (ELO), but whenever vacancies arose, either at intergroup or region, I was always in another post, so the opportunity didn't arise.

In 2018, our region didn't have a Regional ELO, and as I was Regional Secretary I attended the annual Regional ELO meeting in York. Talking to the ESC members, I learned it was NOT a requirement (for membership of the ESC) to have had a position at intergroup or as a Region ELO. I applied for the ESC vacancy and was accepted onto it in October 2018.

Around three months ago, the Vice Chair of the ESC asked me to give a main share at a major presentation to managers of a national organisation. I was delighted to be offered this opportunity to serve and gladly accepted.

As time grew nearer to the presentation, I was a bit nervous and unsure of precisely what I should say. This would be the first time I had addressed any employers as a member of AA. Obviously, my experience as an alcoholic manager would be part of it, but I wasn't certain of what else to include – or, just as importantly, what to leave out. I prayed about it and made some "bullet points" to guide me during my share, and having put them into semblance of a reasonable order, I waited for the big day!

I was thankful to have become used to Zoom meetings (this was a Zoom presentation) and I found that once I started sharing, the words just came naturally. I thank my Higher Power for guiding me through!

The feedback after the meeting clearly showed my share had been well received. Most importantly, this and of course the main presentation opened the managers' eyes to what AA was all about and gave them suggestions and encouragement to point anyone with potential or actual alcohol issues to us.

So, to sum up, I felt really grateful that I had been used to carry our message, which of course is part of Step 12, especially in the current COVID lockdown, when so much outward-facing service seems impossible. But it's not!! Opportunities may be difficult to find, but they ARE out there.

Andrew Wetherell:

My name is Andrew Wetherell, and I'm a Non-Alcoholic Trustee on the General Service Board, and a member on the Employment Sub Committee (ESC). I have also recently joined the Literature Sub Committee where I have been warmly welcomed.

The ESC recently received a request for some "Alcohol Awareness Sessions", and my colleagues & I developed a package which we have successfully delivered to around 30 Team Managers at a major insurer in December.

The two Zoom sessions were very well received and the post-session feedback was overwhelmingly positive. The company concerned are already speaking with us in respect of further sessions in 2021 where we would be looking to deliver them to their broader staff group across Great Britain.

In what has been such a challenging and worrying year, it was a wonderful experience for us to be able to deliver some 12 Step work to a large employer, and I think it gave all of us on the ESC a major and enormously welcome morale boost. The sessions ran for about an hour, were chaired by Jim L, and took the following format:

- Welcome, introductions, and a look at the format / running order
- PowerPoint presentation by James C and myself (alcoholic and non-alcoholic working in partnership, as per our AA history)
- Screening of our Employment video
- Experience, Strength and Hope share by Rob D
- Question and answer session (questions answered by all those mentioned above, plus Mike P [ESC Chair], Sean N, and Roger E)
- Details of further information and support (via PowerPoint)
- Evaluation session and Close

As mentioned above, both sessions were extremely well received, and the following comment is just one of many which provides the overall flavour:

"This was a really good session. I was really touched by their honesty and bravery. I have spoken very highly of this session to all my peers and Team Managers and encouraged them to attend a session"

I would have to say that the element which had the biggest impact on the audience was Rob D's personal share, together with the answers provided by my alcoholic colleagues, and I am sure we were successful is dispelling some myths and at the same time educating people about what AA is and what we can offer to the still suffering alcoholic.

We are all thoroughly looking forward to delivering further sessions for this major employer, and we very much hope to use the model we now have to deliver similar sessions to other employers. Further, we will be looking to share the above experiences and associated presentation / handout materials with colleagues in the regions.

On a final positive note, during the most recent session, I did a quick calculation of sobriety, and on a modest estimate the cumulative total of my ESC colleagues' sobriety came out at over 90 years!

The Power of Online Meetings

The first known online voice AA meeting in Europe, first164yp, was started in January, 2009, as a Monday night meeting on Skype by Dallas T, an American living in Milan, Italy, who had served as the Young People's Contact* for the Continental European Region (CER). Hence, the "yp" in the name.

At the beginning, there were technical challenges. Skype had its limitations. Our computer devices, connections to the internet, and internet provider all had limitations.

However, Dallas had a vision to provide a weekly English-language AA meeting for English speakers in Europe who were not close to or could not get to a face-to-face English-language meeting. He left to pursue studies abroad, but today, deep into the

pandemic quarantines, first164yp continues to be a "god-send" to many alcoholics in recovery. Hardly a week has gone by when somebody doesn't express how first164yp has saved their life and is continuing to do so.

Greeted with enthusiasm by younger members of AA around Europe in 2009, online meetings met resistance as "fake AA". We explained we were not trying to replace face-to-face meetings, but to offer more alternatives for sharing experience, strength and hope in recovery from alcoholism and for carrying the message of AA.

Meeting attendance waned, but we publicised the meeting on the CER website (https://alcoholics-anonymous.eu/), attracting new members, and the meeting survived. A meeting group conscience was taken and together we created an AA group, a 7th Tradition collection, and expanded to offering meetings five nights a week. The challenge was and still is to attract a stable, reliable cohort of trained tech hosts.

As more were attracted to first164yp, the group conscience made the bold decision to offer ten meetings a week – two simultaneous meetings Monday through Friday at 20:00 CET (Central European Time / GMT+1), first164yp and first164yp2. Our technical coordinator sends out a weekly schedule to all tech hosts and the tech host team is connected today in a WhatsApp group to instantly text each other if a last-minute substitute is needed or a tech host is encountering technical problems.

Over the past two years, meeting attendance gradually rose to an average of 250 participants per week (25 per meeting) before drifting slightly downward. When the pandemic hit in March 2020, our two simultaneous meetings suddenly shot up to 90 participants each. We quickly opened first164yp3 to address the explosion of demand for online meetings and kept that open until shell-shocked face-to-face groups discovered for themselves appropriate online platforms.

Today, demand is back to pre-COVID "normal" of around 140 participants per week, an average of 14 per meeting, ranging from 8 to 28 per meeting. There is usually a core of regulars, a wider circle of frequent attenders, and always someone new to AA or new to online meetings.

The link below includes our group-conscience-designed first164yp meeting chairperson's script, fine-tuned by the group conscience throughout our nearly twelve years of experience. The last update was May 2020. Please feel free to use it and adapt it to your group's needs.

May we all continue to "carry the message" through whatever media become available as humanity continues to progress in offering ways to connect with each other. Bill W would have been thrilled.

The monthly production of SHARE magazine is a team effort; it is essential for the Assistant Editor to be an experienced team player with good experience of service within AA including service at Intergroup and preferably service at Region. Computer

and email competence is indispensable. It would be desirable to have previous editing experience but training will be given.

This is a four-year unpaid commitment, although expenses may be claimed.


